

A conjunction is a word that joins other words, phrases, clauses or sentences. Some conjuntions are: <u>and</u>, <u>as</u>, <u>because</u>, <u>but</u>, <u>or</u>, <u>neither/nor</u>, <u>for</u>, <u>since</u>, <u>so</u>, <u>until</u>, <u>yet</u>, and <u>while</u>.
