Beginner **Simple Past Tense**



Completed action in the past.

Use the Simple Past to express the idea that an action started and finished at a specific time in the past. Sometimes the speaker may not actually mention the specific time, but they do have one specific time in mind.

Examples: I saw a movie yesterday.

I **didn't** see a movie yesterday. Last year, I **traveled** to Japan.

She washed her car.

A series of completed actions.

We use the Simple Past to list a series of completed actions in the past. These actions happen 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th...

Examples: I **finished** work, **walked** to the beach and **found** a nice place to swim.

He arrived from the airport at 8:00, checked into the hotel at

9:00 and **met** the others at 10:00.

Single Duration

The Simple Past can be used with a duration which starts and stops in the past. A duration is a long action often used with expressions like "for two years," "for five minutes," "all day" or "all year."

Examples: I **lived** in Brazil for two years.

Shauna studied Japanese for five years.

They sat at the beach all day.

We talked on the phone for thirty minutes.

Habit in the past

The Simple Past can also be used to describe a habit which stopped in the past. It can have the same meaning as "used to". To make it clear that we are talking about a habit we often use expressions such as "always," "often," "usually," "never," "...when I was a child" or "...when I was younger" in the sentence.

Examples: I **studied** French when I was a child.

He played the violin.

She worked at the movie theatre after school.

ACTIVE and PASSIVE SIMPLE PAST

Active Past – the subject is the doer of the action.

Passive Past – the subject is the receiver of the action.

Examples: 1. Tom **repaired** the car. - Active Voice

2. The car **was repaired** by Tom. - Passive Voice
