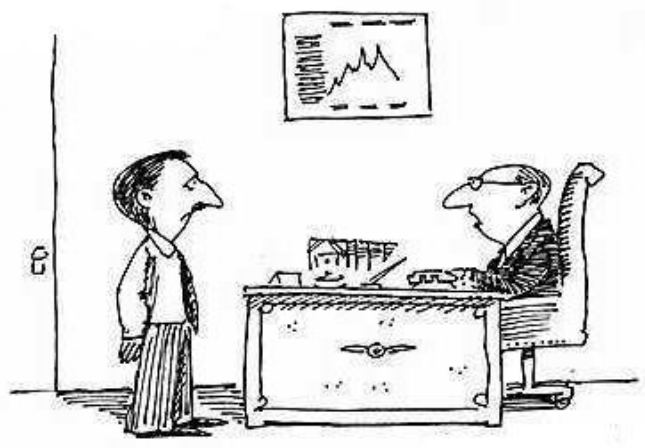


# Phrasal Verb 101: Lesson 31 T

Common phrasal verbs, with meanings and examples. Phrasal verbs are usually two-word phrases consisting of **verb + adverb** or **verb + preposition**. Think of them as you would any other English vocabulary. Study them as you come across them, rather than trying to memorize many at once.

Verb	Meaning	Example
<b>take something out</b>	remove from a place or thing	Can you <b>take</b> the garbage <b>out</b> to the street for me?
<b>take someone out</b>	pay for someone to go somewhere with you	My grandparents <b>took</b> us <b>out</b> for dinner and a movie.

<b>tear</b> <i>something</i> <b>up</b>	rip into pieces	I <b>tore up</b> my ex-boyfriend's letters and gave them back to him.
<b>think back</b>	remember (often + to, sometimes + on)	When I <b>think back</b> on my youth, I wish I had studied harder.
<b>think</b> <i>something</i> <b>over</b>	consider	I'll have to <b>think</b> this job offer <b>over</b> before I make my final decision.
