The lion's share ---- the majority of, most (superlative)

- >> <u>The lion's share</u> of the federal taxes in the United States goes into entitlement programs such as Social Security and Medicare
- >>Billy shared some of his candy with his friends, but he kept *the lion's share* for himself.

Pile up ----- to remain unaccomplished, to accumulate. Usage note: used for chores or other work that is not done according to a normal routine.

- >>The vehicles <u>are piled up</u> on the street by now.
- >>The more I delay in doing household chores, the more they *pile up*.

Come up short----- to have less than correct amount. Usage note: refers to the amount of money, separable idiom. pocket, she *came up* ten dollars *short* her drawer.
